Outrageous Duality: UAE's Covert Role in the Sudanese Conflict.

#### **Introduction:**

As the UAE actively positions itself as a key player across Africa, it engages in dubious diplomacy in Sudan. While formally pushing for peace as a member of the Quad, the UAE's weapons paradoxically fuel the conflict, exemplifying an outrageous duality of a country claiming to talk of peace while actively contributing to war.

# **Expansion and Motivations:**

The airfield's expansion in Amdjarass indicates a sustained effort by the UAE, and the motivations behind doubling down on General Hamdan remain puzzling. The UAE's interest in Sudan as a potential source of food, coupled with the desire for a Red Sea coastline position, underscores its strategic ambitions. Additionally, Middle East rivalries with Egypt and Saudi Arabia contribute to the complexity of the situation.

### **Conclusion:**

The UAE's involvement in the Sudanese conflict reveals a disturbing duality, where a nation ostensibly engaged in humanitarian efforts is, in reality, fuelling the very conflict that forces Sudanese refugees to flee.
